Celebrating



Holy Week

Holy week is going to be like no other, ever.

The liturgies of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Easter will be celebrated in each parish church by a lone priest. The liturgy of Good Friday will be celebrated only in the Cathedral by the bishop and the priests who live in the cathedral house with him.

As with the daily mass at the moment, we have to share in the liturgies of Holy Week through associating ourselves by prayer and / or watching on line.

Chrism Mass

The Chrism mass which usually takes place in Holy Week, when all the priests in the diocese gather



with the bishop in the cathedral, celebrate mass together, renew their priestly vows, and bless the holy oils to use during the following year.

This year the mass will be postponed until later in the year.

Prayer to guardian angel

This is a traditional prayer, which had fallen out of use, probably for centuries, which once was said by people who were unable to go to mass. It has now found a new life, and can be used to associate yourself with the mass offered in your parish that day, perhaps saying it at the time you know mass is being celebrated, but it could be said at any time.

Dear Guardian Angel, go for me to the church, there kneel down at the mass for me.

At the offertory, take me to God and offer Him my service: what I am, what I have, offer as my gift.

At the consecration with your seraphic strength, adore my Saviour truly present, praying for those who have loved me, for those who have offended me, and for those now deceased, that the blood of Jesus may purify them all.

During Holy Communion bring me the Body and Blood of Jesus, uniting Him with me in Spirit, so that my heart may become his dwelling place.

Plead with him, that through his sacrifice all people throughout the world may be saved.

When the mass ends, bring home to me, and to every home, the Lord's blessing. Amen

Though it had been forgotten by bishops and priests, the faithful people of God remembered it, and someone gave it to the Cardinal in Westminster, who reminded the rest of the church in this land of it.

Novena to Our Lady of Walsingham

Following the rededication of the church in our land to Our Lady of Walsingham last Sunday, a novena of prayers was started, bringing the trials of this time to Mary in Prayer.

Normally a novena lasts for nine days. This novena will continue each day until the pandemic passes.

O sorrowful mother, intercede for our separated brethren, that with us in the one true fold they may be united to the chief shepherd, the Vicar of thy Son.

Pray for us all, dear Mother, that by faith, fruitful in good works, we may all deserve to see and praise God, together with thee in our heavenly home. Amen
